Literacy

All of the Learners are trying

to write poetry without crying

This fortnight, our Learners continue to read, perform and write poetry. Learners are exploring the ways that Australia can be described using emotional and descriptive language. They are developing a vocabulary of language used in poetry as well as formal and informal Australian language.

Inquiry Unit

Who are the First Australians and how do we know?

This is the question that our Learners have been exploring as they begin our Inquiry unit on Australian history.

Our Learners have been exploring evidence including time-lines, learning about rock paintings and uncovering information about ancestral remains such as Mungo Man.

Learners are beginning to explore Aboriginal people of historical significance as we begin to investigate the arrival of European settlers and the multiculturalism in Australia today.

Music



Learners have been listening to and singing along with Australian songs written by artists to teach us about the landmarks and important elements of our counttry. We have been discussing why artists choose to write lyrics about Australia.

Mathematics

What time is it? When are we going? How long until dinner time?

These are all questions we hear from children on a regular basis. As we begin this fortnight learning about the topic of Time, we hope that our Learners will begin to answer some of these questions for themselves.

The Junior Learners will begin exploring time by using time language before looking at using and reading analogue clocks.

The Senior Learners will begin exploring the language of time before practicing their skills at telling the time using analogue clocks. Learners will then begin using their knowledge of time to help them to solve problems.

Once again we encourage our Learners to wear a watch to school. At home we also encourage parents to use the strategies of telling the time in practical ways (eg. in ten minutes it will be bedtijme. What time will it be?)

Respectful Relationships

Learners have loved participating in interactive team building games and role playing exercises to identify their character strengths and what these look/feel like.

All Learners are looking forward to diving into their character strengths that they feel they would like to improve and setting goals around it.

CHILDREN'S CHATTER MATTERS!

Focus: Find the synonym or antonym!

If your child has a set of spelling or tricky reading words they're working on this week, you can play games to build the words' meaning words. Decide whether the object of the game is to name antonyms or synonyms for the words. Once that is established, one player selects a word. Set a timer for one minute. See how many antonyms or synonyms each player can come up with in that time. For example: humid – muggy. Close, steamy, oppressive, stuffy. Discuss tricky word meanings and try to put them into meaningful sentences. You could use pen and paper, and ask each player to write their words down.
