

The Importance of Reading at Home

There is no more important skill for a child to master than the skill of being able to read. The following excerpt is taken from an article by the Victorian Department of Education and Early Childhood Development

Reading to Young Children-A Head Start to Life: Key Findings

The frequency of reading to children at a young age has a direct causal effect on their schooling outcomes regardless of their family background and home environment.

Reading to children at age 4-5 every day has a significant positive effect on their reading skills and cognitive skills (i.e., language and literacy, numeracy and cognition) later in life.

Reading to children 3-5 days per week (compared to 2 or less) has the same effect on the child's reading skills at age 4-5 as being six months older.

Reading to them 6-7 days per week has the same effect as being almost 12 months older.



Classroom Activities



Syllable Awareness

Syllable awareness is the skill of hearing the sounds within words and recognising that words can be broken into syllables or word parts. The skill requires counting, tapping, blending (e.g. kan-ga-roo = kangaroo) or segmenting words into their word parts.

What's Happening in the Classroom?

Welcome to Week 4 of learning everyone. It certainly has been busy in the classroom with Swimming, Shrove Tuesday and a special Ash Wednesday liturgy. In the classroom we have introduced Reading Diaries, with many students getting closer to achieving their 'ten nights of reading' certificates. Please read the article on the previous page by the [Victorian Department of Education](#) which has some interesting information about the **Importance of Home Reading**.

Literacy: F-2 The students are learning how to write recounts about their weekend and swimming lessons. They are using the five Ws in their writing: When, Who, Where, What, Why/How? In Phonological awareness our Preps are learning the upper and lower case letters of the alphabet and the common sounds they represent. This is taught through songs, puzzles, craft and listening activities. Our Grade 1s and 2s are learning about digraphs (two letters making one sound) such as chat, ship, etc. In Reading we have been listening to the story *Clark the Shark* and learning about the characters and setting of narratives. **3-6** In Literacy 3-6, students have finished their drafts on recounts of their favourite holiday. We will be now looking into narratives and how to create an engaging story to start to hook the reader in.

Numeracy: Our F-2 students are practising their counting skills. This includes counting forwards and backwards by 1s up to 20 for our Preps. Our Grade 1/2 students are skip counting by 2s, 5s and 10s from 0 to 100. They are also learning to locate and order numbers on a number line. **3-6** In Maths, students have been sharing their understanding of place value by ordering and creating visuals of numbers. We will be continuing to show numbers in their different parts.

Inquiry: Our topic for the rest of the Term is Social Justice. The students are learning about fairness and equity. Through hands-on activities such as projects, artwork and cooking the students will deepen their understanding of the similarities and differences between cultures and generations. **3-6** In Inquiry, students have been learning about the rights of children and will be continuing to research into organisations that support children.

Religion: As we begin the season of Lent we are called to strengthen our relationship with God through prayer, fasting and almsgiving. The students are being introduced to many learning experiences, beginning with our Lenten promises where they are encouraged to give up the gift of time to help others. Over the coming weeks the older students will deepen their understanding of the forty days of Lent which represent the period that Jesus spent in the wilderness during his temptation.
