Literacy

Learners have continued to explore poetry this past fortnight with many Learners publishing their poems.

Senior Learners have been exploring their own style of poetry including the pattern of rhythm and rhyme when writing.

Junior Learners have explored both Shape poems and Cinquain poetry as they have learnt to recognise a verb, noun and adjective.

This week we have begun to focus on Information texts. This focus will provide valuable opportunities for our Learners to write about Australia's history using the structure, language and features of Information texts.

Music




Australian lyrics and music continues to fill the corridors at school as we explore Australian artists and lyrics. Enjoy some of these tunes at home as a family as you too learn more about our country.

Mathematics

Telling the time is an important life skill as our lives are often dominated by time. Being punctual, on time for an appointment or celebration and to be able to organise your time and completion of tasks within a day.

Our Learners have been learning to tell the time to the hour, half hour and quarter hour. Some Learners are able to tell the time to the minute and can move between analogue and digital time.

It is wonderful to see so many of our Learners wearing a watch which supports this learning throughout the day in practical ways.



Respectful Relationships

Learners have enjoyed playing games and identifying the strengths we use in those games. This week we introduce a 'Celebration tree' which will hold some of the strengths of every Learner by the end of the Term and be on display at school as a constant reminder of the amazing things we are all capable of.

Learners are also beginning to dive deep into their own self awareness of what they know about themselves and consider strengths they are able to display well (eg. persistence) and which areas they would like to set a goal to get better at (eg. bravery in different situations.)

Focus: Swapping sounds!

Swapping sounds or playing a game of spoonerisms is an excellent way to develop your child's sound awareness and pre-spelling skills. Start by having fun with their names for example: Miles Jones – Jiles moans. Paul Jennings has developed a wonderful book with many pictures of the various spoonerisms so the students can see the different meanings each spoonerism conveys. To catch a hat – to hatch a cat or trickier ones – A dragon fly – a flagon dry. These are also a great way to extend your child's vocabulary at the same time. Encourage your child to draw their own sponnerism pictures. Bugs are slurping – slugs are burping!!!
